

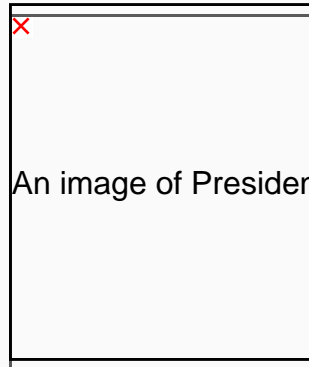
Disability in History: U.S. Presidents
